# Let's Take a Walk! "Retro Town: Aboshi"

We editorial volunteers visited the Aboshi area the other day. The Aboshi district, located in the western part of Himeji City, has long prospered as a fishing and shipping area, rich in nature thanks to the Seto Inland Sea and the Ibo River. We made a lot of new discoveries there, so let us introduce them. Please use this article as a reference when exploring the Aboshi area !

#### 1. Aboshimachi Koryukan

Here, you can get a tourist map and local information, buy local vegetables directly from the market, and rent bicycles.

A free shuttle bus (not in service on Wednesdays) to Eco Park Aboshi, which runs from Sanyo Aboshi Station, passes through the *Aboshimachi Koryukan*.

### 2. The Yamamoto Residence

The volunteers kindly explained the local information to us.

This is a historical building with a harmony of Japanese and Western styles built by Mr. Yamamoto, the president of Aboshi-Bank, about 100 years ago.

Inside, you'll find a marble fireplace, a study and hallway bathed in stained-glass light, and even a seashell-walled washroom. The whole building is like a work of art.

On the 1st and 3rd Sundays, you can tour the inside of the house with a volunteer guide. You will need to pay 300 yen for the materials.

### 3. Former Aboshi Bank Head Office

This is a Western-style building with a domed roof made of bricks that was built about 100 years ago as the head office of Aboshi Bank. Currently, it operates as a restaurant.

### 4. Daicel Ijinkan

This building was built as a lodging for foreign engineers. There are two existing buildings, one in green and the other in red. The green one is open to the public only on weekdays as "the Celluloid Museum".







# 5. Eco Park Aboshi (Health Promotion Center: Reflechosa)


"*Eco Park* Aboshi" is a garbage disposal site. And "Refrechosa" on its premises has a heated pool and bath that uses the heat generated when garbage is burned. It has also a fitness gym and a ground golf course available for anyone to use. A free shuttle bus runs between Sanyo Aboshi Station and here.

## 6. Area on the west side of Aboshi Nagisa Park

In this area, there are restaurants where you can enjoy seasonal seafood (oysters, whitebait, conger eel, etc.).

### 7. Others

North of Sanyo Aboshi Station is Usuki Hachiman Shrine, where the Lantern Festival is held. And there is a famous *sake* brewery near JR Aboshi Station.





The town of Aboshi was not greatly affected by the war, and the sight of local people living in the old buildings moved us. Also, their quiet and warm humanity healed us. We would love to go again with our friends!

# Do You Wear a Helmet?

OSince April 2023, a new law recommending all bike riders to wear a helmet has been enacted.

Bike accidents can bring severe injury in many cases, especially for head injuries. There is no penalty for not wearing a helmet, but it is recommended to you to wear it on a bike, and to be careful not to get injured yourself.



In Hyogo prefecture, local regulation says it is mandatory to obtain bike insuarance.

# Mr. Munetaka Myochin

Have you ever heard the chime of the clock at the north side of Himeji station? That is the sound of Fire Chopstic Wind Chimes, which are made from iron. The Myochin family makes these wind chimes and Munetaka Myochin is the 53rd head of the family.

The Fire Chopstic Wind Chimes is one of the representative products from Himeji.

## **Q** Tell us about Fire Chopstic Wind Chimes.

A The Myochin family began making armor and helmets over 850 years ago. When the armor was no longer used, my family began to make the Fire Chopstick Wind Chimes in order to keep their old traditions alive. My father (Munemichi Myochin, the 52nd head of the family) designed the Fire Chopstick Wind Chimes using the sound of the fire chopsticks.


### **Q** How do you make the sound of Fire Chopstic Wind Chimes?

A We beat on the glowing iron, *tamahagane* (material of swords), and titanium with a hammer many times. The delicate degree of burning and hammering is a secret known only by my family. The sounds and skills cannot be expressed by machines.

#### **Q** How did you master the skills?

- A I dropped out of a university and became an apprentice to my father because I wanted to support him. Every day from morning to night, my father was beating glowing iron sticks with a hammer, bent in front of a furnace that reached 1300 degrees. As I saw his working style, I trained to create a sound of my own. It took me five years to create a beautiful sound. I spent the next ten years creating a steady, clearly lingering sound. Still, I cannot create a beautiful sound if my mind is cluttered. I will try to be sincere in creating a beautiful sound.
- **Q** At last, do you want to tell something to the readers?
- A You cannot produce good results without patience. There is no 100% of guarantee of success. Challenging yourself leads to next step. It is important to work on something diligently and keep pushing through.
